Ritchie and Crouch. (2003) Developed the Competitiveness Model of Tourism Destinations. They argue that natural and cultural resources are core factors of destination competitiveness. Heritage assets contribute significantly to long-term tourism sustainability. Effective planning enhances economic and social benefits. Their framework supports analyzing Diu's colonial heritage as a tourism resource.

Although many studies discuss heritage tourism and Portuguese colonial influence in India, most research focuses on Goa, with limited attention to Diu. There is a lack of empirical studies specifically examining how Portuguese colonial heritage in Diu contributes to tourism development, local employment, and economic growth.
